# INGEBORG BACHMANN CENTRE FOR AUSTRIAN LITERATURE

The Austrian contribution to modern German-language literature has been both rich and varied, embracing major novelists (Kafka, Musil), dramatists (Schnitzler, Bernhard), and poets (Rilke, Celan) of international repute.

The Ingeborg Bachmann Centre, recently established at the Institute with the support of the Erste Bank, the Österreichische Nationalbank, the Austrian Cultural Forum and the Österreich Kooperation, will explore this contribution with writers-in-residence and through a programme of lectures, seminars, workshops and reading groups co-ordinated by an Austrian *Lektor*.

The outcome of an innovative form of cross-institutional co-operation, this exciting academic initiative will concentrate on Austrian literature of the twentieth century, focusing above all on developments from 1945 onwards and taking as its figurehead Ingeborg Bachmann, whose poem 'Abschied von England' encapsulates the challenge presented by other cultures and the difficulty of comprehending them.

# David Josef Bach and Austrian Culture between the Wars

As Director of the Sozialdemokratische Kunststelle from 1919, David Josef Bach (\*Lemberg, 1874, **^**London, 1947) was a pivotal figure in Vienna's cultural life, earning enormous respect for a dynamic programme of events that strove towards cultural consensus in a society increasingly polarized between Right and Left.

The first day of the symposium (accompanied by an exhibition that includes original works and manuscripts by Kokoschka, Kraus and Schoenberg) will take place at the Austrian Cultural Forum, the second at the Institute of Germanic Studies.
