# Programme of Events 2005-2006



The founding of the Ingeborg Bachmann Centre in 2002 was an important initiative in bringing to a wider audience the rich and varied contribution made by Austria to modern German-language literature. Supported by the Austrian Cultural Forum and the Österreich Kooperation, the Centre today plays a significant role in the literary and academic life of this country, and its programme of conferences, workshops, readings and performances have set landmarks in introducing contemporary Austrian literature to a British public.

At the centre of this year's programme is the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Mozart's birth, which will be celebrated with a recital at the Guildhall School of Music by Gottlieb Wallisch and the Hugo Wolf Quartet, and a major conference at Queen Mary, University of London.

This year also sees the first Ingeborg Bachmann Centre Lecture, at which the speaker will be a scholar of international repute who has made an outstanding contribution to research in the field of Austrian literature or culture. We are honoured to have Professor Ritchie Robertson (Oxford) as our first lecturer.

The season opens with a conference on the experiences of Austrian exiles from Hitler in Britain, and a wide-ranging programme of readings and workshops, seminars and reading groups will be held throughout the year.

Alfred Komarek began writing detective stories as a means of financing his law studies at university. The first of a series of novels featuring the character Polt ('Polt muss weinen') won him the coveted Glauser-Preis for detective fiction written in German in 1999. His latest bestseller, 'Die Villen der Frau Hürsch', in which the journalist-detective Daniel Käfer makes his debut, and which has been made into a successful film, has further enhanced his popularity in the German-speaking countries. ## **Mozart: A Celebration in Words and Music**

A recital to mark the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the composer's birth.
