Sunday April 18th 1751 We set sail
 from Salines Bay Cyprus at six o'clock
 in the Evening — Monday 19th ditto
 standing off ^{the same bay} Cyprus having gain'd but
 very little ground by reason of a directly
 contrary Wind — Tuesday 20th ditto
 By observation at twelve o'clock we
 were in thirty four & thirty four Cape
 de Gatte distant some three leagues
 to the westward & bears exactly West by
 North of Us — the Country about ^{the} Cape
 looks very pretty & seems well cultivated
 at this distance is full four leagues to
 the Eastward of the Point of the Cape Gatte
 the highest Mountains I have seen in Cyprus
 are to the North of Limasole from N.W. to
 N.E. Cape de Gatte is properly two Points

blew fresh & contrary Saturday 24th

The Wind moderated & more favorable
Monday 26th ditto In the evening
We had a faint glimpse of Cacamo
but at a very great distance at sunset
Tuesday 27th the weather very mild & clear

At evening we had a distinct view of Cape
Cacamo Wednesday 28th ditto Some
any wind that favorable in the evening
We had a fair view of Cape Cacamo
the seven Capes & likewise of Rhodes
We must be now near eight leagues
from Rhodes yet too very visible so as
for Cacamo & the seven Capes we
certainly saw them some twenty five
leagues distant - Thursday 29th ditto
Tacking off Rhodes the Wind not favora-
ble but moderate in the evening the
Land Breeze favorable we gain'd the
Strait between Rhodes & East
Tide and the main Land Friday 30th
At seven o'clock in the morning we
were opposite the Harbour of Rhodes

The Dawn make a good appearance
as one sails by, of which Bora took a view
the wind very fair & fresh several valleys
green sick between the high hills & for
agreeable Landscapes as wasel along
the Island now are we along side
of the Island Simia (with a fine gate)
which is very rocky & barren there is
a detached Island or Rock on the South
side of the Island not marked in Deshler's
Map & there which he has set down on the
North side nor there but away to the North
beyond a high Promontory which projects
from the main Land to the Northward
The Island Simia which I believe has
plac'd too far to the Southward. Our

Course now NW by W. We have Cape Leo
on our Starboard Bow & beyond it appears
the high Land of Starks rising quite in a
point, right a head is Nicen's opposite the
West of Cape Leo, on our larboard Bow is
Piscopia on whose NW West point are two
small Isles or Rocks & likewise one to the SSE
point, and away to the SSW is Carchi's to the
East of it & to the South by East of Nicen's
both high Islands but smaller than Piscop
The main Land has but a barren Ascent
& deep bay runs away to the Eastward of
the Land to the East by North I believe an
high barren Mountain seemingly
detached from the Hills, & remarkable
We pass Cape Leo at five o'clock in the after
noon ditto Birds looking pretty being
all covered with which they were sailing

figure seeming to hold with his two hands
some thing his Club probably upon his left
Shoulder. Next his left hand another
female figure a Muse perhaps in a
gentle dancing attitude and there is
another (I believe) following the
pleasing figures but much defaced part
of this last is broke off with the whole
Stone. About thirty paces distant in the
same Wall is the Body of a female
Statue whose Drapery & the whole the
Contour is vastly rich & fine in a
fine white Parian Marble. I printed
small Inscription there but were flatter'd
with the promises of driving leave to see the
Castle in which they say there are several
Inscriptions & but they do not
We could not gain the mountain

Sunday May 2. Set out a mule Back to
visit the Hot Spring We rode along the
sea shore three quarters of an hour or
Eastward the gardens of our right very
pleasant planted with oranges Lemons &
& all sorts of fruit Trees & Greens which are
here in great plenty & perfection, the
plain is very fertile & well watered with
Springs or small brook which use on the
side of the Mountain be cut six or
eight of these channels which each
a small stream we turned up the Hill
to the Southward pass by a lake on
our left hand some half a mile long
& a quarter in breadth may be a mile
distant from the sea to sweet water,
having rode over the Mountain is rather

Our Course about Cape Res directly
opposite to us this Part of the Island
and the rocky mountain comes quite
to the sea side leaving a foot passage
hardly upon its Shore. This hot water
is frequented only in Summer not to
be come at but in that season when
the Sea not beating so near the Rocks
leaves a Beach some yards broad just
upon whose Edge they People in great
numbers from all Stanchio come
scraping the Sand by that time they
have removed three or four inches of its
Surface the water rises in great plenty
& very clear they put their tubs & pails

It is rather hot than tepid very clear &
pleasant purges & is greatly esteemed We
began to clear away the Sand low
The water rose clear hot & had been
began to prepare my Thermometer of
Bothes to get some when a spray of
the Sea overflowed our Well & we in
vain endeavour'd by a kind of Bank
to keep of the Sea an attempt which
freshen'd of the Waves succeeded so well
that not only our Mine was overwhell'd
but we ourselves oblig'd to leave our
Station here as no sort of remains of
Buildings the Rocks very bold & come quite
down to the Sea we returned over the
Mountains which are cover'd with sweet
herbs & shrubs in no want of Springs &

We passed by only two or three small habitations
of Assassins. The Town & Plain looks ^{stagnant} dead
from the Hill two hours the same Road we
had come brought us back to Sanchez
We went aboard & sailed about three
o'clock after noon ditto. The Plain
& Town of Sanchez makes a better
prospect to the North after we had
passed the eastern point of the bay
off of which runs a Shoal a great way
the Cape of the Main opposite high
Land the town makes a figure a mile
up the Country there seems to be a good
as to the west of that the Point of the
Cape the Rocks look very romantic
where is likewise a Port & many small

Rocks lay off this Cape our Course WNW.
On our left hand we have Capra bold

In the afternoon ditto we went to Micon
